Mohammed Sesay (Newton committee member) telephoned Rachel (Chair) on 24th April to inform her that the works on the water well had been completed and that clean, fresh water was now freely available again within the village.

The torrential rainstorms in this year's rainy season damaged the Newton water well. It had to be reconstructed using concrete and then have the pipes and taps replaced. Fundraising in Olney through the Barn Dance and the Buckingham Chamber Orchestra concert enabled the final amount of 5 million Leones to be sent to the Newton Committee in early April.

The Institute of Computer Studies, Newton

The computer school we set up in the Skills Training Centre (now known locally as the Institute of Computer Studies) is to be sponsored from September 2013 by an Institute of Business Technology affiliated to the University Of Sierra Leone - excellent news indeed. 12 years ago a group of young people who had experienced unimaginable problems during a 10 year civil war got together and asked the people of Olney for help. The Housing Project came first and then the building of the Skills Training Centre. They had no experience of building, planning, budgeting or business but with the help of funding only from us they have themselves founded a computer school in the village. Yes, we can be pleased, but those young people can be immensely proud of their achievement; they made mistakes and have learned a lot and this must also be good for the future. We will be developing the remaining two parts of the centre into an administration block and a Building and Carpentry School and I hope that those people here, who worry that charities should not be giving handouts to Third World Countries thus making them dependent on aid, will see that we are not doing that, they are very much helping themselves to improve their lives. 

Olney—Newton Link Annual General Meeting



The meeting began with a thought provoking talk from Mike Flood, from Powerful Information. He described the plight of the disabled in Sierra Leone and explained what his organisation has been doing to help them since 2004. They are particularly concerned with women's education, having set up learning circles aimed at building confidence and self esteem, and ensured that leadership training has made the organisations self sufficient. They have provided education and skills training for the visually impaired so that they can become useful members of the community without having to rely on their children for support. Mike told us the story of one blind woman who now makes soap and has a valuable role in her village. Many problems they had encountered were familiar to us, but their successes were impressive.

The cutting of the Tenth Anniversary cake by chair Rachel Lintern and Rena Partridge, founder member, preceded a break for refreshments.

The business meeting followed, with reports from the officers including Rachel, Chair of the Link, who reported that there was a slow start to the year, due to the elections in Sierra Leone, which completely disrupted normal life there and made communication very difficult. Great success has been achieved with the development of the Skills Centre (now the Institute of Computer Studies, see page 2), the repair of the water well and continued aid for the Health Centre. Unfortunately the Solar Suitcase intended to help by providing power for midwifery services has been impounded at the airport and as yet despite continued appeals to the government there, the US suppliers who sent it out and government departments here it has not been released.

Claire Lintern sent a moving and comprehensive report about her time in Sierra Leone; she is teaching in Goderich, just outside Freetown and has been there for 7 months. She described how the repair of the well made so much difference to people's lives in Newton and how essential fresh water was to prevent the spread of diseases such as typhoid and cholera. In Goderich they have piped water but the supply is erratic and at the time she wrote they had just spent two weeks without water at the peak of the hot season. Imagine living so close to the equator and being unable to shower or wash your clothes...

She begged us not to give up and not to feel that the work we put in isn't worthwhile. Little steps make all the difference in Sierra Leone and although instant results are not always seen the help is long term and the benefits may be immeasurable. She truly believes that the Olney-Newton Link has played a part in improving the lives of ALL the community of Newton as well as that of Olney.

Claire will be coming back to the UK in July and we look forward to hearing all about her year.



And last of all, our congratulations went to Rachel and Brian Lintern who are celebrating their 40th Wedding anniversary.

School News



The schools are applying for another grant to further their work by connecting classrooms. Teachers from Olney Middle School, Olney Infant Academy, Lavendon School and Olney Ousedale Campus hope to visit Newton in 2014. Pictured are the three headteachers from Newton who visited us last time, with the members of their staff who hope to come to the UK next year. Mr Sesay from the Ahmadiyya Secondary School is also hoping to visit.

The schools are delighted that they have been able to talk to the teachers in their partner schools using Skype. Some of the children from Olney Middle School have been able to ask the head of Christ Evangelical School questions about the children at his school. Fund raising has also enabled the schools to purchase metal cupboards, sports equipment and classroom resources for their partner schools.

Life in Sierra Leone: Money

Paying the bill in the guest house wasn't easy when the teachers from Olney Middle, Olney Infant and Lavendon Schools visited Newton in 2010. Counting out the notes in 1000s was exciting, as you can see from the photos. Currently the exchange rate is about 6300 Leones to £1 so a 1000 Leone note is worth about 15p. Children in school there are taught to count in 1000s, for obvious reasons.

The visiting teachers found it quite tricky when money was being discussed as we were never quite sure whether a sum of money written or stated as 500 meant 500 Leones or 500,000 Leones.

Shopping was not quite so difficult as the range of goods was restricted and relatively inexpensive. The photos are of the indoor (vegetables, condiments) and outdoor (dried fish) sections of the market in Newton. The bananas tasted wonderful but the smell of the dried fish wasn't so appetising.
