

CHAIR'S REPORT FOR THE AGM 2015

The year began very positively, full of optimism. We had just returned from SL and had seen various projects in Newton and spoken to the committee so we were all geared up to extending the Water Well, finishing off the toilet block, and improving and extending the Skills Training Centre. No serious signs of Ebola.

Gradually the news became more and more worrying. A state of emergency was declared, and schools closed until end of September. The Baptist minister, Brima James Kabia, began to text and later use Facebook to describe his work as a tracer, and then as a hygienist. We started to hear the most heartrending news of what was happening in Waterloo, the township adjacent to Newton. But Newton had no cases. We responded to the request for buckets of disinfectant etc to place in strategic areas around Newton and it seemed to be working. I shall never forget the panic stricken text message I received from Bakarr saying that suddenly they had 10 homes in quarantine and then this was quickly followed by 60 homes in quarantine. The government were overwhelmed, Aid Agencies such as the World Food Programme were limited in what they could do, so we needed to do something to help as quickly as possible. Hence the appeal in Olney 'Help Kick Ebola out of Newton'.

The response, as you have seen in the financial report, was very pleasing indeed and I think Olney can be proud of its response. Ever since Rena's plea for help after the Civil War in SL, which began the Olney- Newton Link, we have learned to listen ever more carefully to the people out there and respond to what they want and not over-rule them with what we think they should want. This has to be weighed against the responsibility of the trustees here to ensure that money donated for a particular cause does get to that cause. This is not easy, as the two cultures are very different and sometimes we find it very difficult to accept that they are doing something which would be totally alien to us. This was particularly relevant when we were allocating the funds that were coming in for Ebola. Obviously you cannot give money 'to Ebola', it is a vicious virus which, like all living things took the opportunity to spread and thrive. We had to interpret the purpose of the money as being for the relief of suffering due to the effects of Ebola and the prevention of its spread, both now and in the future. I hope everyone who donated so generously to the Link is happy that that is what we did and what we continue to do. The Sensitisation Workshop was something that we couldn't possibly envisage as happening over here; it was hugely important in SL but virtually impossible to actually measure its effect. Since the beginning of the New Year we have been delighted to have financed three sets of public toilets in Newton. They would like us to do more but have suggested we stop there for a while to allow the community to gain trust in using them. There was a very real fear of using such places through fear of catching Ebola, hence the need for education or sensitisation as it is called in SL. Instead we have been asked to fund a Preschool and support centre for 3 to 5yr olds, and some older children, who have lost relatives or guardians through Ebola and therefore need extra support. The trustees have accepted this challenge and we will need to raise approximately £10,000 to build and furnish it. We have sent £1000 already and are on the way to a further £1000 but we would really appreciate some sponsorship. Any ideas?

I'm not going to get involved in politics but I do think that those of us who were closely involved with the Ebola crisis have learned a lot about what is meant by International Aid. A lot is promised, little is actually delivered both on a day to day level and during a crisis. This may be a cynical view but national governments are really only interested in their own electorates as witness, for example, the withdrawal of direct flights from London to West African destinations. This was done against all scientific advice and has cost the UK millions of pounds more than it should have done as all aid workers, and there were many wonderful nurses and health workers who risked their lives from the UK, had to go via Brussels at twice the cost. I could go on! The country that quietly gets on with aid is of course China. They are making huge inroads into West Africa, including the new Lunghi Airport.

But, back to earth! Thankfully we are more or less over that particular crisis. Somewhat battered, but having learned a lot. I must thank all who helped throughout the year, including the trustees, all of whom had to suddenly respond to requests for approval of funds to be sent out by the day before yesterday. I am particularly indebted to Anne, we held each other's hands, metaphorically speaking, throughout the Ebola crisis. Tricia, our treasurer, has been very busy this year and we are grateful to Liz Brewster who helped Tricia to organise the accounts and introduce some of us oldies to a Dropbox. Janet has done invaluable work as Secretary and must be congratulated on her production of the Newsletter. There are many many people in Olney who have donated time and money but we would like to acknowledge two in particular. One is the Heron family who over the years have donated dozens of boxes of First Aid and simple medical equipment, allegedly out of date, but of huge benefit to people in Sierra Leone, and the other is the Phonebox who have supported us with free publicity for many years now.

AGM Guest Speaker

Lori Spragg from Build on Books



Disease and Development in Sierra Leone

If you weren't at the AGM you missed an excellent evening! Our speaker was Lori Spragg, founder of Build on Books, a charity which was initially set up to recycle unwanted books from a school in Marlow to a library in Waterloo, Sierra Leone. More schools became involved and they have now sent 1/2 million books and created over 170 school libraries, as well as building 9 boreholes with water pumps and several sets of public toilets.

Lori reminded us of the extreme poverty in Sierra Leone; the country was ranked 183 out of 187 countries in the world in terms of Human Development (HDI). After the devastating Ebola virus, the situation has worsened; there are 12,000 children who have lost one or both parents, many doctors and nurses have died, industry such as mining has ceased to function, markets have closed, farming has stopped, schools have only just reopened having been closed for nearly a year and some charities withdrew due to the risk to their workers. The immediate effects on families include: loss of income, difficulty in obtaining food, disruption to education (some girls have been married off to lessen the burden to their families), poorer access to healthcare (hospitals have only dealt with Ebola) and fewer work opportunities.

The future is uncertain. Ebola is being eradicated but the country has multiple health problems caused by typhoid, malaria, cholera, dengue fever and hepatitis A. Health care facilities are inadequate for pregnant women, resulting in high mortality rates for mothers and babies.

Build on Books works with a team of volunteers in Waterloo. Their Ebola prevention programmes provided information workshops and fed and clothed quarantined families, just as the ONL did in Newton. One interesting idea Lori recounted was the establishment of a peanut farm. Peanuts grow rapidly in SL and provide an essential source of protein to combat Kwashiorkor.

Lori also told us some very moving stories about families who suffered through Ebola. Although the virus had a terrible effect in Newton, we are very thankful it was not as devastating as it could have been, due in part to Olney's wonderful support in providing funds to combat the disease.

Our thanks go to Lori for her interesting and inspiring talk, and we wish her continued success in her work in Sierra Leone.

Our elections here in Sierra Leone are scheduled for 2017; perhaps our leaders and political activists will look at the past few months and learn how to be more tolerant of opposing views. Only then can we truly call this country we love a free and democratic society.
