Terrible disaster in Freetown



At 6am on August 14th, after three days of torrential rain, flooding caused a mudslide that ran down a hillside and destroyed a large area of Freetown (the capital of Sierra Leone), killing an estimated 1,300 people. Most people in the hillside settlement of Regent were in their homes at that time of the day and many were trapped. The natural disaster was probably made worse due to overcrowded, poorly built settlements and the clearance of trees to create more space.

Flooding is common during the rainy season in Sierra Leone. This year, 104cm of rain fell in July and August in Sierra Leone, which is three times more than expected (US National Weather Service's Climate Prediction Center).

A week of mourning was declared in the country. Governments in the UK, UAE, Turkey and Israel pledged help.

Large displaced populations, limited clean water supplies and no or unhygienic places to go to the toilet, all create the perfect conditions for deadly diseases to spread fast. Within four days of the disaster, the Sierra Leonean government had called on the new UK Public Health Rapid Support Team to deploy to Freetown and help them prevent a major outbreak of disease.

The team of experts (two microbiologists, two epidemiologists and a logistician) commit to jumping on a plane within hours of a disaster anywhere in the world. It was created in response to the world's slow reaction to the Ebola outbreak in West Africa. Little did the team know that one of its first deployments would be back to one of the worst Ebola-hit countries. They look for first signs of diseases such as cholera, measles, malaria and typhoid and plan strategies to avert epidemics.

The Newton Committee called on us to help as well. They asked us to make a donation to the fund which is raising money to rehouse over 3000 people made homeless in the landslide.

Olney trustees considered this, and whilst the people of Newton are not directly affected, we felt that we wished to help, as large numbers of their friends and relatives are involved. A decision was taken to hold a raffle at the Quiz with the proceedings being donated directly to the 'Build on Books' fund for Mudslide disaster relief.



Don't Bank On It!

Recent experiences with sending money to Newton have highlighted the differences in financial affairs between our two countries. Do you remember the days before we had debit cards, credit cards and 'holes in the wall'? Those were the days when to get cash for our daily lives we had to go INTO the bank and write a cheque 'to cash' and hand it over the counter to receive 'the readies'. We have become so used to making payments by card and going to a reasonably nearby ATM and withdrawing cash. 18 months ago when our son-in-law visited the UK he commented that he rarely saw us actually exchange money for our purchases and therefore wondered if we were really aware of what we were spending. So, what happened to promote this article? We frequently send money to our committee in Newton to carry out the work of the Link. The process entails a fairly lengthy but robust procedure. A Formal Request is made to the International Funds Transfer organisation, FCStone INTL, who seek to obtain the best rate of exchange for the sum we wish to send. This request requires a confirmation by another member of our committee to accept the rate of exchange before the transaction can be completed. The rate is for a 'forward date' a couple of days later and the funds are transferred internationally to a bank in Sierra Leone with which the INTL trades. That recipient bank then has to transfer the funds to the Newton Committee's bank account. In theory this process is secure and reliable, but can be subject to 'human error' etc at times. Just to add to complications Ecobank, which the Newton committee use, decided to close their branch in Waterloo next to Newton and transfer the account complete with a changed account number to a branch in the Eastern part of Freetown. This simple change means that to obtain the cash to pay for goods they now have to travel somehow into Freetown and no doubt waste literally hours with travelling and queuing in the bank, an operation which we would undertake at a local ATM. Frustration occurs when on reaching the counter they are informed that the money is not in the account. We then get a phone text message 'we are in the bank but the money is not there!' On these occasions we then have to institute an investigation via INTL to obtain written proof of the transfer and then WhatsApp the information to Newton to endeavour to locate the funds. This is, one might say, at least frustrating at both ends, but is to some extent a symptom of the deficiencies in their electricity supply, lack of telephone land lines and other infrastructure. There

is clearly still a lot of development work to be done! With all these difficulties one must give due respect to the Newton committee who try to do the Link work whilst also carrying on with their efforts to earn a living.
