Digging for Victory! The Farming Basket

The ONL has begun a new project to support women in Newton. These ladies are the breadwinners for their families and due to the Covid 19 crisis have been unable to provide an income.

Correspondence with Brima James Kabia, pastor of the Newton Baptist Church, who appealed to us for help in February.

From James

Good morning all,

I am glad to inform you that we have gone through the lockdown with no death from the covid 19. The Only problem is the economic situation in the country as a whole; the rural communities is the worst. With this in mind, I am presenting a project proposal on micro grant for the women who are the bread winners of their homes for your consideration.

Due to the Advent of the Covid 19 these women are unable to run their homes as before. Here is the Project Proposal:

Project Tittle: "The Farming Basket"

This is going to be for 20 women beneficiaries with their dependents.

Each woman is to receive the sum of Le. 1,500,000.

This will enable them to buy two bags of groundnut, ten bundles of cassava cuttings, ten bags of sweet potato vines and two cockerels.

This will enable them to revive their standard of living.

The cultivation of those planting materials and the rearing of the chickens will help them to raise money to take care of their children and wards.

Thank you all for your attention. Looking forward to hearing from you.

ONL reply

Very glad that you have survived the lockdown. Our economy has also been badly affected by Covid 19, as has our ability to raise funds.

Can you advise how the 20 ladies would be chosen, please?

Also would you purchase the plants/materials etc for them or would they do this themselves?

Thank you for your proposal, we will consider the request with the other Trustees and return to you.

Hi Anne, thank you for these enquiry.

Yes I can, the ladies are predominantly famers who economic lively hood depends on group farming. It is a mix basket of single parents, widows, and less privileged women. All these are bread winners in their respective homes. The beneficiaries will buy their planting materials except for the chickens, they will be procured by me.

I was/am helping them in our own little way before and during this Pandemic period. James

Good afternoon, I hope you are well? Just to let you know the Trustees have resoundingly agreed to send you money to enable the farming basket project. We'll arrange to transfer the money early next week to your account, that we've used previously in joint names. We are looking forward to hearing how the project progresses and wish every beneficiary a great harvest.

Claire Lintern sent us some photos of vegetables growing so we know what they look like.

From Claire who lives in Bo, Sierra Leone ...

I wondered if a couple of photos would help with the information about the project from James? It seems a great idea, easy to see the benefits and easy to keep a track of. We are now in the dry season so no real vegetables are growing but I can show you the heaps needed for planting potato. And yes it's the leaves we eat as well as the tubers. Cassava shoots are done in a couple of ways but also need heaped soil, they tend to be round though. Cassava shoots look like pale asparagus and are stuck into the ground! Again it's both leaf and tuber eaten, BBQ cassava is yummy!!! And I've included our cockerel. Stay well. All the best, Claire

Chair's Report—Anne McCallum



A sense of déjà vu has come over me as I write this year's report! However, things are improving and there is light at the end of the tunnel, as the vaccination programme rolls out and restrictions are gradually lifted. In Sierra Leone, covax has meant that various professionals, including teachers, over the age of 40, have received their first jab.

I hope that next year's AGM will be an "in person" meeting.

Before I review the Link's work this year, I want to take a moment to say thank you and farewell to two remarkable ladies, without whom the Link would not exist nor have achieved so much. Those of you who have seen Janet's excellent tribute, in the last newsletter, will be aware of the achievements and the dedication of both Rena Partridge and Rachel Lintern to the Link. It was Rena's vision of establishing a friendship link, between the Parish Church of St. Peter and St. Paul's, Olney, with St Mary's Church, in the hamlet of Newton in Sierra Leone, through their connection with John Newton, in 1998, that started the Link.

Sierra Leone was then in the grip of a brutal and devastating Civil War (1992-2002) and, it was in late December of the year the friendship link began, that Newton was ransacked by rebels, with a reputation for abduction, amputation and rape. No wonder the population fled into the bush - some to Freetown, some abroad. The houses, schools and churches were ransacked, about a third of the houses were burnt down, livestock was stolen, books, personal belongings and furniture burnt and some people killed or abducted – total devastation for a rural community. Through her contacts in the Church and with the CMS, Rena set up a "network" to send aid to Newton. Many former residents were unable to return home as their houses no longer existed. Working with people, who had returned to Newton and with those still in the displaced persons' camps in Freetown, a principle which has remained at the heart of the Link, she started to raise funds to send to help rebuild houses at their request

The Rebuild Newton Project was a great success, despite the need to overcome many difficulties, not least the heavy rains. The project work was carried out by the people of Newton, as it still is today, and by 2006, 60 houses had been completed. In addition, the committee here organised the collection and shipping of books, typewriters, sewing machines and other necessary items. Rena travelled to Newton in 2000 to ascertain the situation and meet the people.

Rachel became really involved, following her retirement from teaching, in 2003 when she accompanied Rena, her daughter Claire Lintern (now Tarawally) and Josie Pond on a life changing trip to Newton. Further aid was sent, including a shipment of bicycles, and several more visits took place to help establish a deeper understanding.

Rachel became Chair in 2006 and was responsible for the expansion of the Link's activities. The schools' link, which was very important to Rachel with her background in education, expanded, allowing interaction between children here and in Newton. Both Rena and Rachel knew the supreme importance of breaking down cultural division through contact and understanding. As you know, under Rachel's stewardship, the Link has raised thousands of pounds to enable the building of the Skills Training Centre (now part of the University of Freetown) and, particularly dear to her heart, the Preschool, as well as water wells, to provide support for business enterprises, among many other projects, and care and provisions, during the Ebola crisis. Both Rena and Rachel believed passionately in personal contact with the community in Newton and in working with them. Both had a love for Sierra Leone and its people that inspired others, as much as the example set by their work. I hope that we can continue to expand the Link and achieve even more, carrying on their legacy for many years to come.

This year, although our resources have been limited, we have been able to work with the Newton Committee, with Pastor Brima James Kabia and the schools, to provide financial assistance, for various projects.

We have sent money to buy solar powered radios, at the request of both the Newton Committee and James, to enable pupils, particularly those studying for exams, to listen to Education Department broadcasts. The Preschool, under the guidance of Rachel and her husband, Brian, our Vice Chair, established contact with UNICEF, and through its help, obtained details of the Education Department's requirements for "adoption". Among these were the building of a perimeter wall and "carpeting" throughout the school. We sent funds to purchase materials for the wall and carpet. James Kabia, the local Baptist minister, asked for money to help with a clean drinking water project. This uses an existing well, from which water is pumped into a large tank. The system includes a purification system, generator to power the pump and a jack pump. It serves about 1300 people and a small charge is made locally, to cover repair and maintenance costs and fuel. It was lovely to see the happy faces of those collecting the water.

We have also been able to send funds for a Farming Basket project. This works by giving a set sum of money to, at present, a group of 20 women, widows and single parents particularly, who are the main or sole bread winner for their families and dependents. They are all crop farmers and the money allows them to buy cuttings and plants and some chickens. They can then, hopefully, feed themselves and sell any surplus.

The people of Newton continue to inspire us with their fortitude. Their concern for us during this pandemic is very humbling, when you consider how much we have, and take for granted, and how little they have.

Thank you to all of you who have supported the Link over the last year, when life has been difficult for us all. Thank you to our regular donors, those who fill our collection boxes, for one off donations, for those who have started money making ventures, without you we wouldn't survive. Thank you also to our helpers who continued to show interest and support, despite our inability to hold events. Thank you to all who have joined our Zoom quizzes and donated that way. My husband, Rob, has kindly organised the quizzes, with questions on a multitude of topics – including chocolate and sweets! These have raised much needed funds and been an opportunity to meet, albeit remotely.

Finally, thank you, as always, to my fellow Trustees for their continued help and support. I hope that when lockdown is over and we are able to get together again, I will be able to thank you all in person.

Please continue to encourage others to become involved and help us to keep this very worthwhile Charity going.

I would like to take this opportunity to issue a plea for those of you who can, and who don't already do so, to set up a standing order to provide us with a regular income – otherwise why not use one of our collecting boxes for cash. Please remember, too, that for every £1 you donate we are able to claim back £0.25 from the government, provided you are a tax payer and have completed (and returned to me) a Gift Aid Declaration.

Unfortunately, last year we missed out on holding our biggest fundraiser, a bottle stall at Dickens of a Christmas, and this year we will miss out again on one of our bigger fundraisers – Cherry Fair – because of lockdown.
