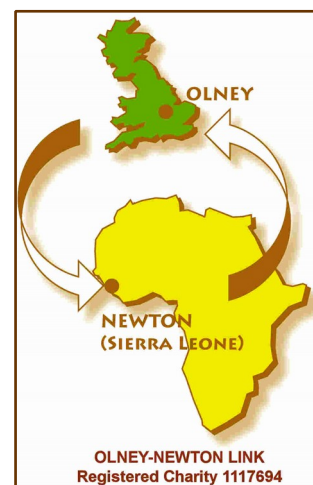

A Remarkable Concert



As I walked into the Great Hall at Bedford School I couldn't help being impressed by the surroundings. Catherine Rose had chosen the venue to celebrate her 50th birthday, largely because it was the only place available to book on a Sunday that had an organ, an essential ingredient of what she had planned as her birthday present to herself.

Catherine had wanted to conduct an orchestra to play "An Alpine Symphony" by Richard Strauss for some time so the occasion of her birthday presented her with an ideal opportunity to realise her dream. She invited her many musical contacts to play and managed to assemble around 120 musicians (no mean feat in itself) to come together on Sunday 20th October. The orchestra rehearsed during the day and the early evening performance to invited guests formed the centrepiece of the party.

The magnificence of the setting was matched by the splendour of hearing so many musicians playing together in one orchestra. The sheer range of instruments, including two harps, was breathtaking, as was the sheer dynamic range offered by such an enormous orchestra. The piece portrays a day climbing in the mountains, beginning with a most evocative and unforgettable depiction of sunrise and moving through a soundscape of the many different emotions and experiences of alpine life. A truly amazing visual and aural experience which was greatly enjoyed by both the audience and the players, all of whom felt honoured to be part of such an occasion.

Catherine also raised funds for three charities by requesting donations instead of gifts. £297 was raised for Olney -Newton Link.

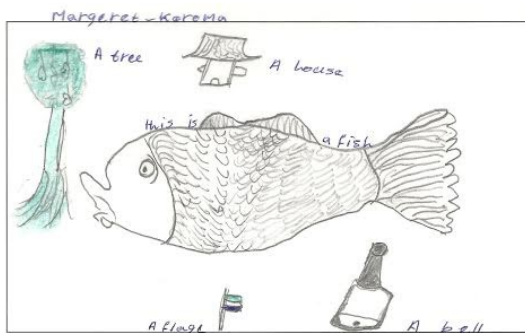
Schools' Report
