

Well, well, well...

The population of Sierra Leone in 2004 was 4 million. There was no census in 2014 due to the Ebola crisis but by December 2015 the population was stated to be 7,750,641. And 1? Who knows!

The Olney Newton Link began supporting Newton in 2003 with the building of 80 houses to replace those destroyed in the civil war. In 2006 the Skills Training Centre was started to provide education for adults in IT, with plans for future training in health care and construction skills such as carpentry. This centre is now fully operational and has been renamed 'The Olney Newton Institute of Technology' and it is affiliated to the University of Sierra Leone. Two blocks of Public Toilets were constructed in 2014, much needed to improve public health.

Then Ebola struck and all our resources were diverted into providing disinfectants, first aid equipment, education seminars, replacement household goods for those who had had their belongings burnt due to infection and toys and clothes for children affected.

Our current project is building a preschool for orphans of the crisis, so that their carers (distant relatives or just neighbours) can still work during the day. Associated with this is the construction of a well, providing water for the preschool, Institute and the public toilets.

We are very fortunate to have an experienced and dedicated Newton Committee — including Bakarr (Secretary and manages the Institute) and Mabinty (Treasurer and overseeing the preschool project) and Val, the Chair—who have been working with us since 2003 and are all unpaid volunteers, needing to work full time as well as with the Committee. This makes the ONL so effective—all money raised is put to use in Newton, there are no salaries to pay or premises to maintain either here or in Sierra Leone.

Wells in Sierra Leone are either dug by hand or constructed with a pipe in a bore hole. The Newton Committee has opted for the hand dug version because these are easy to deepen if they run dry, and don't need expensive machinery to construct.

As you can see in the photograph, someone digs out at the bottom and the excavated rock and soil is pulled to the top in a bucket. There are no ladders—the unfortunate digger has to get in and out by climbing using toe holds in the sides.

The AGM: Chair's Report 2016

After the horrors of Ebola and the need for instant action in an attempt to alleviate the suffering where possible, this year has seen the Link, in conjunction with the Newton Committee, try to come to terms with the aftermath.

A lack of money and the need to import materials have always been issues, but these are now more acute than before Ebola. These problems, combined with the loss of skilled labour, have made it more difficult to progress projects.

Considering this, our current project, the Preschool, is remarkably well advanced and it is hoped that the roof will be on before the rainy season sets in!! Those of you who have experienced the rains in SL or in West Africa will know that it is impossible to continue working when the rain comes!

One of the Link's major strengths has always been our "counterpart", the Newton Committee. They are the Link's "ears and eyes". The Trustees rely on the Newton members to provide us with details of the wants and needs of the community. Their local knowledge is invaluable in ensuring that we back projects that will actually benefit the people of Newton and, essentially, be sustainable in the future.

In addition to the Preschool, which will enable children from 3-5 (who have lost one or both parents or a main bread winner to Ebola) to be cared for, whilst their current carer works to ensure food to eat, we have also dealt with a termite crisis at the STC, now renamed the Newton Institute.

At the request of Bakaar and other members of the Institute committee, we have established an annual bursary to enable local people to study. 10 students will benefit this year. Most of these will be mature students, who missed out on an education due to the Civil War.

None of the above would be possible if it were not for our supporters. All of you are an essential part of our work in the help you give, be it practical, financial, or both.

Support comes in many guises: space in the Phonebox, Corporate membership, sponsorship, helping with stalls and at events, running in marathons, sponsored walks, giving of your time, filling collecting boxes with loose change, organising concerts, collecting first aid equipment and books, the list is endless. Everyone's effort is invaluable and I want to thank you on behalf of the trustees and the people of Newton. As always, if any of you would like to join us or have fundraising ideas, we would love to hear from you.

Finally, as we move forward, we ask for your continued help to ensure the fitting out of the Preschool, the building of a water well, and, maybe, an extension to the Institute (STC) to provide a medical unit and other projects yet to be revealed. Please don't be annoyed when we badger you for help, money, goods, your time etc., it is all in a very good cause!

My personal thanks also go to the Trustees, who have supported me in my first year as Chair, especially to the Link's Officers. I particularly want to thank Rachel, who, far from disappearing into the background, has worked as hard as ever!!

Building the Preschool

These photographs were recently received from Mabinty Sesay, Newton Treasurer, via Whats App. They are nearly ready to start the roofing and have begun to construct the concrete floor. They are hoping that the preschool will be in operation by September. The building of the well nearby will make it much easier to mix the concrete needed and of course it will be essential once the preschool is in operation. The well will cost about 25 million Leones, which is about £2800 at today's rate of exchange.





All the concrete has to be moved by hand, in bowls carried on the workers' heads. Imagine a bowl of washing up water and then think of concrete being two and a half times as heavy...

The blocks used for construction of the walls have to be made on site — they cannot be bought, unlike here.
